Jesus' Sadness Over Jerusalem

³¹ At that time some Pharisees came to Jesus. They said to him, "Leave this place. Go somewhere else. Herod wants to kill you."

- ³² He replied, "Go and tell that fox, 'I will keep on driving out demons. I will keep on healing people today and tomorrow. And on the third day I will reach my goal.' ³³ In any case, I must keep going today and tomorrow and the next day. Certainly, no prophet can die outside Jerusalem!
- ³⁴ "Jerusalem! Jerusalem! You kill the prophets and throw stones in order to kill those who are sent to you. Many times, I have wanted to gather your people together. I have wanted to be like a hen who gathers her chicks under her wings. And you would not let me. ³⁵ Look, your house is left

empty. I tell you; you will not see me again until you say, 'Blessed is the one who comes in the name of the Lord."

Reflection on the reading

As we know, Jesus was a controversial figure. Against a backdrop of tension between freedom to practise faith and necessary allegiance to the Roman occupying forces and the huge inequalities in society, anyone offering the possibility of a way through presents both a hope and a threat. As Jesus' following grows, so does the anxiety that he and his disciples might upset the delicate balance that currently maintained the status quo. We heard how in today's reading from Luke, that the Pharisees' warned Jesus. That may have been out of genuine concern for his welfare, or a wider concern for keeping the peace or another temptation to Jesus to walk away from his calling. Jesus, however, is clear about his purpose – and while he had lived and proclaimed the kingdom of God, he had not yet fulfilled all that he came to do. Identifying himself clearly as a prophet (although he was and is more than that) and speaking openly about his pending death, he also demonstrates God's compassion for Jerusalem as the symbol of the people of God and the location of God's presence in the Temple.

How many times do we feel compelled to do or say something that we feel is ethical and correct but may well be against the current feelings in our local environment or society. It is often very difficult when you feel driven to point these things out and take action when others warn you of the consequences and how it could make you very unpopular. All this can definitely put us off taking action and leads us towards 'going with the flow' and leaving things as they are.

During this time of Lent, we should be even more aware of the strength of our faith and beliefs – not 'giving up' on what we know is right and staying close to the good and true teachings of Jesus. I always feel that, during Lent, giving up chocolate or biscuits or similar doesn't make a difference but persevering with what is 'right' and 'good' and not 'giving up' or 'giving in' to the 'norm' is a far better aim. When we think of how our Lord and Saviour resisted the temptation to take the easy route and just go along with what society expected, we know that we too have to take this path and, empowered by the Holy Spirit, we know he will be there to lead and guide us, keeping his promise to be with us always.

As a child, I was always taught to think and look at things differently and form my own opinions and, never having attended a school as I was taught at home, I was very much able to follow my own path of thought, something for which I am very grateful in life as, guided by the love of God and our Lord and Saviour Jesus, perseverance will overcome obstacles and objections. As Winston Churchill famously said "If at first you don't succeed, try, try & try again UNTIL you succeed!" – empowered by the Holy Spirit we can achieve!

Let us go forward in this season of Lent remembering the words of Psalm 27 that we heard earlier – "The Lord is my light and my salvation— whom shall I fear" – indeed let us move forward with conviction persevering with the right and good, empowered and protected by our Father in Heaven.

Prayers for the world, others and ourselves

We bring our prayers to you for our World and think of all the areas of unresolved conflict, where deep-seated grievances and complex history collide, where shattered lives and destroyed cities are the evidence for our wars and we feel helpless at so much brokenness:

God of our hope, we place our trust in you. In political decision making on energy, security, aid and sanctions, where true leadership and wisdom matter, when government should meet the needs (and not the wants) of the people, when costly decisions are needed, and self-interest needs to be set aside for the good of others:

God of our hope, we place our trust in you. In freezing temperatures, and when snow falls, when the homeless, refugees and frightened families shiver in distress, when our visa policy is too complex and bureaucratic to save the desperate when, in our relatively affluent country, many go hungry and many with homes are struggling to stay warm amid rising energy costs, we know that change is needed:

God of our hope, we place our trust in you.
In our relative security and safety in this country.
where we are tempted to trust in our own strength,
when our compassion fails,
when we lack the imagination to walk in the shoes of the dispossessed,
and we lose sight of our own dependence on you:

God of our hope, we place our trust in you. In the mountains of our possessions, when we spend, acquire and accumulate things that do not lead to life, and are obsessed with more, bigger and better we forget the needs of others:

God of our hope, we place our trust in you. In the tangled conflicts at home, school or work in which we are trapped, when we cannot give in and the desire to win is greater than our desire to continue, soften our stubborn hearts, we pray:

God of our hope, we place our trust in you. In the absence of safety and home, when refugees flee to the borders in the pauses between shelling, when a humanitarian crisis is building, and families are torn apart and we fear the fresh horrors of the news:

God of our hope, we place our trust in you. In all our dreams and longings, where freedom itself is at stake, and we yearn for a better, fairer and kinder world, teach us to seek your face and listen to your voice in all our ways and for all of our days:

God of our hope, we place our trust in you. Save us, O Lord we pray. **Amen**
