Worship at Home – 11th May 2025 (4th Sunday of Easter)

A short act of worship for use in people's homes prepared by Marilyn Britt.

Introduction

Good morning and welcome to Worship at Home on Sunday 11th May. My name is Marilyn Britt, and I am a worship leader at Thatcham Methodist Church. It's a bit chilly and blustery as I write this, but the weather forecast is warmer and brighter. I have been on holiday recently and seen some very young lambs in the fields. We shall be thinking today of Jesus our Good Shepherd. Today is also the start of Christian Aid week - a time when we hear more about the charity, their work and how Christian faith is shared by words and action. We'll hear about Tabitha, also called Dorcas, who demonstrated her faith by caring for and befriending vulnerable widows in her city of Joppa. Jesus calls us to live, sharing the news of eternal life and making a difference in the lives around us.

Call to worship (Revelation 7: 15 – 17)

We forget that you are there beside us constantly and that you will guide and strengthen us and show us to do what we should do.

Forgive us Lord when we think we know best.

Have mercy on us as we humble ourselves to bow to your will that will help spread the joy and hope of your love with others. **Amen**

Bible reading - John 10:22-30

Another Challenge to Jesus' Claims

²² Then came the Feast of Hanukkah at Jerusalem. It was winter. ²³ Jesus was in the temple courtyard walking in Solomon's Porch. ²⁴ The Jews who were gathered there around Jesus spoke to him. They said, "How long will you keep us waiting? If you are the Messiah, tell us plainly."

²⁵ Jesus answered, "I did tell you. But you do not believe. The works that I do in my Father's name are a witness for me. ²⁶ But you do not believe, because you are not my sheep. ²⁷ My sheep listen to my voice. I know them, and they follow me. ²⁸ I give them eternal life, and they will never die. No one will steal them out of my hand. ²⁹ My Father, who has given them to me, is greater than anyone. No one can steal them out of my Father's hand. ³⁰ I and the Father are one."

Bible reading – Acts 9:36-43

³⁶ In Joppa there was a believer named Tabitha. Her name in the Greek language is Dorcas. She was always doing good and helping poor people. ³⁷ About that time she became sick and died. Her body was washed and placed in a room upstairs. ³⁸ Lydda was near Joppa. The believers heard that Peter was in Lydda. So, they sent two men to him. They begged him, "Please come at once!"

³⁹ Peter went with them. When he arrived, he was taken upstairs to the room. All the widows stood around him crying. They showed him the robes and other clothes Dorcas had made before she died.

⁴⁰ Peter sent them all out of the room. Then he got down on his knees and prayed. He turned toward the dead woman. He said, "Tabitha, get up." She opened her eyes. When she saw Peter, she sat up. ⁴¹ He took her by the hand and helped her to her feet. Then he called the believers and especially the widows. He brought her to them. They saw that she was alive. ⁴² This became known all over Joppa. Many people believed in the Lord. ⁴³ Peter stayed in Joppa for some time. He stayed with Simon, a man who worked with leather.

Reflection on the reading

The conversation taking place with Jesus was in the winter and they were at the Feast of Dedication or Hannukah rededicating the temple. Were the disciples ready to take on what Jesus was asking them to do? So many people were asking of Jesus 'Are you the Christ - tell us plainly?' So many still not understand who he was. He was not the sort of king they were expecting – he did not have an army – he did have his disciples and his followers but even so, I wonder what they really thought of his miracles. He gave sight to the blind, the deaf could hear, cripples were able to walk again, the mute could speak, and he raised people from the dead. He sat and had conversations with just anyone – even Samaritans. He was not just talking – he listened – he spoke of living water, redemption and salvation. He was not always understood immediately but he always gave people time – he did not give up. He was leading the people to God. 'In the reading Jesus answered, 'I have told you, and you do not believe. The works that I do in my Father's name testify to me; ²⁶ but you do not believe, because you do not belong to my sheep. ²⁷ My sheep hear my voice. I know them, and they follow me. ²⁸ I give them eternal life, and they will never perish. But just as a shepherd protects his sheep, Jesus protects his people from harm. Earlier Jesus had also said 'I came that they may have life and have it abundantly'.

So many things can drown out Jesus's voice as he speaks and guides us. Are we busy, or don't we want to listen? There are so many things which distract us from him.

In our reading from Acts, we hear of Tabitha (also known as Dorcas). She had a vital impact on a community of widows. We don't know whether she was wealthy or living in poverty as many other widows, but she was kind and generous and as it says she had devoted to good works and charity. After Tabitha dies and Peter arrives, he is shown the garments and tunics she has made to help the poor. When she died, the room was filled with mourners, probably many of the people she had helped. When Peter raised her to life, the news spread rapidly throughout the town. Tabitha continued using her gifts and Peter learns more about her faith and how she lives it out to help

others. Tabitha learns from Peter more about prayer and preaching and so using each other's gifts are able to share in the love of God.

We all have God given gifts, and it is up to us to make sure we use them – not to satisfy ourselves but to help others.

I said earlier that this week is Christian Aid week and is marking its 80th anniversary. Here is an article from Christian Aid about Amelia who lives in Guatemala, where the climate crisis is killing her precious crops. She relies on the land to feed her 8-year-old son and 4-year-old daughter. She worries about what her children will eat. A river passes through Amelia's farm, but deadly heatwaves are causing it to run dangerously low. Both communities and crops stand to lose lifegiving water. The cruel injustice is that Indigenous communities like this, have done the least to cause the climate crisis, yet they endure its impact the most. As their farms are devastated, the search for solutions becomes critical. 'With high heat, there is little we can do but adapt.'

Amelia's hopeful that she can combat extreme weather by changing the way she farms. With the support of specialist training from Christian Aid's partner, Amelia is planting resilient crops, conserving water and making fertiliser. Amelia is also a leader in her community, sharing her knowledge with other households, so that one day, no family will worry about their children going without food. This is the unstoppable power of Amelia's hope in action. She is sharing with words and action how they can overcome the problems.

We sang earlier 'Jesus is Lord, creation's voice proclaims it.' We all need to work to ensure that our gifts so that all people can live, and work together and show the love and generosity that God shares with us all.

Prayers for the world, others and ourselves

Lord, hear us as we pray for your creation. We pray for an end to the destruction of the natural word. We hold before you communities who are watching their land become parched, and rivers dry up. We pray for those finding it difficult to feed their families from the land. Show us how to act and energise us that we may use our power to make change happen.

We pray for all those living in poverty - for those who will not be eating a nutritious meal today, and possibly not tomorrow. May we speak up with them for a more equal and just society.

We pray for our world leaders, peacemakers and changemakers. We pray for those community leaders throughout the world who can make a big difference to the lives of those around them. We pray for a just peace wherever there is conflict particularly the Middle East, Ukraine and Sudan. We remember those working in the mission field not just speaking but acting out God's love to all people.

We pray for those who are grieving, those who are ill, suffering loss, homes, livelihoods and trauma. Let them see kindness and comfort.

We pray for those working for Christian Aid, both here and overseas and the generous giving, acting and praying this week.

And we pray for ourselves, that we use the gifts we have been given to help those in need. Wherever we are, show us the opportunities to listen, act or comfort those.

We pray for hope for the future and for the sharing of justice and peace.

Through the love of God, and the power of the Holy Spirit. Amen
