Bible reading - Colossians 1: 15-28

The Son of God Is Better Than Everything Else

¹⁵ The Son is the exact likeness of God, who can't be seen. The Son is first, and he is over all creation. ¹⁶ All things were created in him. He created everything in heaven and on earth. He created everything that can be seen and everything that can't be seen. He created kings, powers, rulers and authorities. All things have been created by him and for him. ¹⁷ Before anything was created, he was already there. He holds everything together. ¹⁸ And he is the head of the body, which is the church. He is the beginning. He is the first to be raised from the dead. That happened so that he would be far above everything. ¹⁹ God was pleased to have his whole nature living in Christ. ²⁰ God was pleased to bring all things back to himself. That's because of what Christ has done. These things include everything on earth and in heaven. God made peace through Christ's blood, by his death on the cross.

²¹ At one time you were separated from God. You were enemies in your minds because of your evil ways. ²² But because Christ died, God has brought you back to himself. Christ's death has made you holy in God's sight. So now you don't have any flaw. You are free from blame. ²³ But you must keep your faith steady and firm. You must not move away from the hope the good news holds out to you. This is the good news that you heard. It has been preached to every creature under heaven. I, Paul, now serve the good news.

Paul's Work for the Church

²⁴ I am happy because of what I am suffering for you. My suffering joins with and continues the sufferings of Christ. I suffer for his body, which is the church. ²⁵ I serve the church. God appointed me to bring the complete word of God to you. ²⁶ That word contains the mystery that has been hidden for many ages. But now it has been made known to the Lord's people. ²⁷ God has chosen

to make known to them the glorious riches of that mystery. He has made it known among the Gentiles. And here is what it is. Christ is in you. He is your hope of glory.

²⁸ Christ is the one we preach about. With all the wisdom we have, we warn and teach everyone. When we bring them to God, we want them to be like Christ. We want them to be grown up as people who belong to Christ.

Reflection on the reading

Today's reading from Paul's letter to the Colossians includes one of the most famous verses in the Bible, and one which has united many people in difficult times. Colossians 1, verse 17 reads 'In Christ, all things hold together' or in the version we heard earlier, 'He holds everything together.' It is a simple verse, and easy to remember because it is so short! Perhaps it is one you could commit to memory this week or write down on a piece of paper or on your mobile, so this reassuring and helpful thought can keep coming back to you in the months ahead. In Christ, all things hold together. Despite its simplicity, it is a crucial verse in helping us reflect on how the world works, and who Jesus is in the midst of all the challenges and pain we face in our lives, see in the news, worry about in our families and communities. Amongst all that seems like it is trying to drive us apart, all the arguments, all the separation, all the breakdown of communities, God in Christ is bringing us back together – or at least trying to. In Christ, all things hold together.' This simple verse is also a reminder of the role we have to play. If we want to get involved in whatever it is that God is 'up to' in the places we call home, then we need to look out for opportunities to bring, and hold, people together. Wherever there is unity amongst division, healing of community breakdown, restoration and forgiveness, God is there. The Christ is there. Are there people. places, situations and relationships which need to know the presence of this healing Christ today? Can you be the hands and the feet that help to hold all things together?

Prayers for the world, others and ourselves. Amen

In this moment Lord, we bring our prayers and our concerns for others.

The world seems so full of problems way beyond our imagining and understanding. Emergencies seem to be almost daily, and we move from one to another so quickly. But these emergencies are still there, and people are still impacted and in need. Our prayers we bring, knowing that even if we fail to listen to you, you always listen to us, you listen to our words, our silences, our yearnings and our longing.

For those in crisis this day, we pray that someone will listen to them. **Lord, hear us.**For those in poverty and destitution, we pray that someone will give them a gift. **Lord, hear us.**For those in pain and anguish, we pray that someone will offer relief. **Lord, hear us.**For those who are hungry, we pray that someone will feed them. **Lord, hear us.**For those who are thirsty, we pray they may be given clean water. **Lord, hear us.**

For those in grief, we pray that someone will simply be with them. **Lord, hear us.**For those who are near the end of life, we pray that someone will hold their hand. **Lord, hear us.**For those who are lonely, we pray they may be befriended. **Lord, hear us.**For those who are frightened, we pray they may be soothed and calmed. **Lord, hear us. Amen.**
